- Get ready for the 2025 CFMS Convention! It takes place May 10-11 with set-up for exhibits on May 9. Sponsored by the Antelope Valley Gem & Mineral Club, the venue is the Antelope Valley Fairgrounds in Lancaster. If interested in entering a competitive display, go to the CFMS website for the Competitive Exhibit Entry Form: <https://cfmsinc.org/2020-cfms-show-forms/>. I'll also have copies on our take-one table at our January, February, and March meetings. The deadline is April 1.

- I'm seeking applications from kids for the CFMS Junior Achievement Award. See my accompany article for full details. The application form is on the CFMS website, and I'll have them on our take-one tables at our next two club meetings. The deadline is March 1.
- CFMS still needs to fill two positions on its roster of committee chairs: Legal Advisor and Public Relations Chair. The legal advisor should be a lawyer or paralegal who can be on-call to address any questions of a legal nature by Federation officers or clubs (not to serve as a lawyer, per se, but to provide informed opinions and advice). Encourage Kids to Go for the CFMS Junior Achievement Award

As noted previously, applications are now being accepted for the 2025 CFMS Junior Achievement Awards, which acknowledge outstanding achievement by kids in hobby-related areas and beyond. For the past couple months, I've had hardcopies of the application form on our VGMS take-one table at our monthly meetings, and I'll continue to place them there at our January and February meetings. It's also posted to the CFMS website (<https://cfmsinc.org/juniors-achievement-award/>) and in the December CFMS Newsletter (<https://cfmsinc.org/newsletters/>).

This award requires a formal application from the junior member that will be scored against other applications. At the CFMS Convention Awards Banquet, winners will receive a Certificate-of-Achievement and \$100. Applicants fall within two age groups: Pebble Pups (under age 12) and Juniors (ages 12-18). The child's age as of December 31, 2024 determines the group. If a child won last year, that child needs to sit out a year to enter again UNLESS s/he has moved up from Pebble Pups to Juniors. After completing the application, kids need signatures of two representatives from their society, e.g., President, Federation Director, Membership Chair, Youth Leader, etc. Applications should be accompanied by a short cover letter written by the child or dictated to a parent highlighting accomplishments to which s/he wishes to draw special attention; basically, "in your own words, tell us where you really shine." Kids then mail or email applications to the CFMS Junior Activities Chair, i.e., me! Questions? I'm happy to field them (jbraceth@roadrunner.com). The deadline is March 1.

Notice of winners, with brief descriptions of accomplishments, will be posted in the CFMS Newsletter, and they'll be honored at the CFMS Convention Awards Banquet. If winners are unable to attend, certificates and checks will be mailed or passed along to an affiliated club member in attendance. Several VGMS pebble pups and juniors have won or been runner-ups since I began this program five years ago. Do you have outstanding kids in your household? Encourage them to go for it!

ROCKHOUND RAMBLINGS

Establishing Provenance from a Recent Estate Donation, and Revisiting a Legend

Responding to opportunities to pick up donations from estates and persons desiring to clear out space is always full of surprises. On a recent opportunity in January 2025, I responded to a general inquiry to our VGMS e-mail, and discovered that a residence in Sylmar, CA was desirous of ridding itself a variety of old school lapidary items to make room in the household. It is worth mentioning also that Tara had a strong desire to see that this equipment to be donated fell into hands that would appreciate it for years to come. After exchanging information and receiving some photos of the goodies, it was clear that some unique items were being offered. I made arrangements to visit as soon as possible. Once again, it turns out we were the first to respond, and were therefore in a position to take a first peak at what was available. Despite historic fires occurring in the LA Area during this time, we checked the reports and maps and determined we could safely make it to the residence which was positioned between the Hurst and the Archer fires in Sylmar. I topped off my trucks fuel tank, brought plenty of water, and picked up my associate Robert Seaton who added two face masks to our protection arsenal. Although our drive was uneventful, seeing no action associated with the Hurst or Archer fires, we did spy ominous gray and orange smoke plumes arising over the coast ranges from the Palisades fire. At this sight, I made my silent prayer to all those affected.

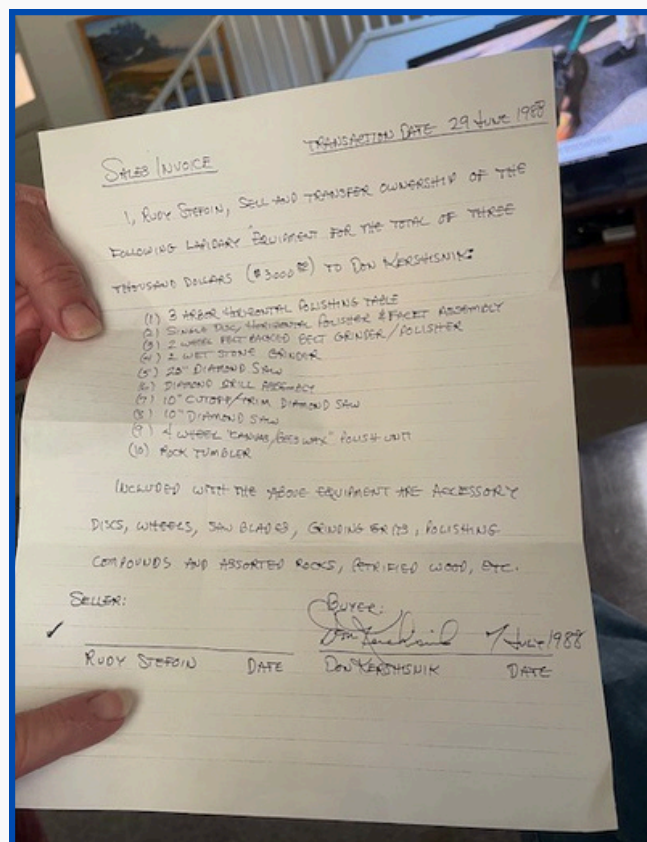
Upon arriving at the residence, we met with the couple Blaise and Tara, who had taken the time to uncover and clean the area out to make it easier to view and access all the equipment. A variety of old school equipment lay before us, much of it "homemade" from the days of yore. It was fun trying to discern the function of some of the pieces of equipment. Other than the obvious slab and trim saw or arbor with wheels, we did spy one item that had its own integral cast iron base with a surface that had three plates designed to spin upon switching on the motor. A box of nearby Silicon Carbide sandpaper of a similar diameter help establish its was some sort of high output three armed polishing unit; complete with water distribution pipes directed to each plate! I had never previously seen anything like it! I always learn plenty about lapidary equipment and its history from these visits.

After going over the available equipment while chatting with the owners, we learned that it all came from some old timer rockhounds. Upon inspecting a huge cylinder half full (about 50 pounds) of silicon carbonate grit, the shipping label listed the shipper as Ed's House of Gems located in Portland, Oregon (where my grandpa, another old timer rockhound used to frequent for supplies), which sadly closed down in 2023. The ship to was addressed to a Rudy Stefoin of Rock Creek, Wyoming.

I have long been a fan of some of the "lost" lapidary materials in rockhound lore and one such material is known as Stefoinite, and I always recalled that it came from a "secret" location in Wyoming. I explained to Tara after reading the label that Rudy Stefoin on the shipping label may be associated with the jasper variety named Stefoinite, and I would look into that idea after I returned home.

Upon returning home, a few Google searches brought me to the following: "Legend has it that back in the 1950s or possibly earlier, Rudy Stefoin and a couple of prospecting friends discovered this gorgeous silicified mudstone with distinct dark veining somewhere in Wyoming. They never revealed the location to anyone. Some have tried to work it out, but so far it remains a lost bit of prospecting history" (www.hillcountrylapidary.com/stefoinite-jasper). This same link provides pictures of this very interesting variety of jasper.

Now with a story like that, who could resist not probing a bit more! So I sent a note to Blaise and Tara stating that I believe the addressee on the grit label was a famous rockhound with a mineral named after him, and Blaise's response e-mail knocked me out of my chair. He sent me a photograph of the original hand written Bill of Sale dated June 1988 for the various lapidary items they were donating as originating from Rudy Stefoin and conveying them to Rudy's neighbor at that time, a Don Kershinik. Rudy according to records passed away later in November 1988. So, we now understood that this equipment all once belonged to a famous rockhound who lived in Wyoming! I don't know about you, but I would always prefer a piece of equipment, typically made in America back in the day from a famous rockhound, than something new out of a box from a factory in China!

I next received a wonderful e-mail missive from Tara who explained her relationship with Don Kershinik. Don was Tara's best friend's father, who it turns out just passed away last year. When Don was in better health, Tara would visit once a week bringing over dinner or dessert and care for Don and his ailing wife while spending time with them. She learned from Don that his old neighbor was named Rudy, who used to make his own lapidary equipment. Tara realized that this same "Rudy" of her younger years was in fact Rudy Stefoin shown on the shipping label, and from which Don subsequently acquired Rudy's equipment per the Bill of Sale. Tara ended up purchasing the entire lot from Don before he passed having at one time intending to take up lapidary as a hobby. This completed the documentation establishing provenance of the equipment. On the Bill of Sale, it also states the sale included assorted rocks and petrified wood. Blaise had sent two photos of rough rock that came from the load that when compared to internet photos were clearly the extremely rare Stefoinite jasper from Wyoming in rough form. Wow, what a fortunate find for Blaise and Tara, the long lost variety of jasper known as Stefoinite was in their possession all these years!

I sit here wondering on the story related from the HillCountry lapidary website around the discovery of Stefoinite. With this new information. I wonder whether the trio were indeed Rudy and his neighbor and friend Don, and one other rockhound from Rock Creek, Wyoming, wearing much younger man's clothes in mid 1950s which would have put them in the mid forties. They were driving out to rockhound Wyoming one day and stumbling across their historic find of unusual brecciated, silicified mudstone which we now referred to reverently as Stefoinite! The excitement they must have shared over the find, the long held secret between them. Who was that third person with Don and Rudy, and did they leave any clues behind regarding where exactly they found this elusive material, or as the legend suggests, is that simply lost to history?

A BLAST FROM THE PAST

Collecting Calico

In going through old club newsletters and our collection of old 35mm slides, it’s clear that collecting in mine tailings surrounding Calico Ghost Town near Yermo in the Mojave Desert has been a mainstay of VGMS field trips going back to our early days. It’s easy to see why. Calico Silver Lace Onyx is a beautiful lapidary material that’s soft and thus easily worked. Plus, although not very colorful, its banded layers contain interesting patterns and dendrites. And takes a fine shine. Not a silent auction goes by where you won’t see at least one chunk or slab of this great stuff that graces backyard rock piles all across the county.

As you can see in the accompanying photos—one from 1959; one from 2014—VGMS members have been field-tripping here for decades. And not just VGMS. Here’s an ad from the December 1973 issue of *Gems & Minerals*, the precursor of *Rock & Gem* magazine:

“The Calico Museum, Calico Road outside of Calico Ghost Town, Yermo, is now open and taking reservations for digging tours in the Calico Silver Lace Onyx Mine. The mine was opened some years ago but never worked on a high commercial basis. It is now operated mainly for rock hobbyists. The fee is \$4.00 per person for 20 pounds of calcite onyx and 25¢ for each additional pound. The minimum charge per trip is \$20.00, whether it is one person or a group; however, collectors are entitled to the full value in the lace onyx. Camping facilities and other services are nearby. For more information write to Calico Miners Museum, P.O. Box 686, Yermo, California 92398.”

I'm not sure whatever happened to the Calico Miners Museum. Although there is the Lane House & Museum at Calico Ghost Town, I don't think that's the same thing. Also, it's no longer a fee trip. Anyone can go there for free. More likely than not, VGMS and/or our sister clubs in the area will do another field trip to Calico in the coming year or so. If not, head out on a trip of your own! Directions to rockhounding sites in the Calico Mountains are found in the guidebook Gem Trails of Southern California, or you can consult our VGMS Field Trips Chair, Tyrone LaFay. I also found directions by googling, "Where can I collect Calico silver lace onyx?" It's an easy, fun trip with the added bonus of an authentic ghost town right nearby from the Wild West days of California silver rushes. Check it out and keep a VGMS tradition alive!

JUST FOR FUN

January's Rockhound Holidays

Last year, we ran a series on little-known Rockhound Holidays, but I didn't begin that series until March, so I have some catching up to do. Here's what Rockhounds celebrate in January!

The entire month is, apparently, National Black Diamond Month, founded in 2015 by jewelry designer Carole Shoshana and subsequently registered by National Day Calendar TM. Meant to promote meditative calm and harmony, as well as mystery and elegance, it was originally dedicated to Shoshana's "Black Diamond Collection" incorporating Feng Shui images of mountains and streams. So is it a holiday, or a month-long commercial? You decide!

Some two weeks after the Winter Solstice comes Perihelion Day. That's January 4 this year. This day marks the moment Earth is closest to the Sun in its orbit. Maybe that's why we've had some unseasonable warm, sunny days this month. (Don't tell that to folks back East, or they may go crazy and stab themselves with an ice cycle!) "Perihelion" derives from two Greek words: peri (close) + helio (sun). As noted by Johannes Kepler in 1596, our orbit around the sun is not a perfect circle but somewhat elliptical, and that ellipse brings us closer to the sun in the winter and further from it in summer. I hope you enjoyed some solar rays on January 4, when we were "only" 91,402,500 miles away!

Finally, Old Rock Day takes place January 7. How did it begin and who started it? Apparently, nobody knows, but we're told to take a moment to consider just how old the Earth is. Before Scotland's James Hutton ("Father of Modern Geology") theorized about Deep Time, folks leafed through the Bible, calculated the many generations mentioned, and came to the conclusion Earth had reached the ripe old age of 6,000. To be precise, Archbishop James Ussher calculated the Day of Creation to be October 23, 4004 BC. Using scientific methods, today that age is estimated at 4.543 billion years (more-or-less). That's old! On this day, we're told to "enjoy and appreciate old rocks," but the means of celebrating are up to you. Per one source, the day's anthem should be Simon and Garfunkel's "I am a Rock."



At 1.7 to 3 billion years old, Scotland's Lewisian gneiss is always included in discussions of Earth's oldest rocks, but meteorites from space often are even older! What's the oldest rock in your collection?

Tiny Gems on Ventura & Santa Barbara Beaches: A Rockhound Mystery

Last February, I took us up close to brecciated Ventura beach jasper with a little photo gallery of several brightly colored specimens as viewed through a microscope. Recently, I turned my scope to another natural wonder from the beach: gemstone sand!

Looking through 65-year-old issues of the defunct magazine *Gems & Minerals* (the precursor to today's *Rock & Gem*), I saw a passing reference to the presence of garnet, zircon, epidote, spinel, tourmaline, and sphene as "flawless specimens of great beauty" in black sands from Santa Barbara beaches. It referred readers to their December 1960 issue and an article by the eminent Robert Norris and C. Douglas Woodhouse entitled "Minerals from the Beach at Santa Barbara." (Side note: as I began tracking down that issue of the magazine, little did I know Troy Schmidt was also seeking it! We both found it more-or-less simultaneously. Anyone else out there interested in sand?)

The article noted most beach sands in our part of California are composed of "relatively uninteresting and unspectacular" quartz and feldspar grains and contain perhaps just 1% "heavy minerals." However, at spots along the beach you may observe dark streaks. I've seen them myself all the time on Ventura beaches and always assumed they were patches of mud and vegetative debris or perhaps oil tar residues. Wrong! Per Norris and Woodhouse, these little patches are where waves have sorted sand grains, and those patches may consist of as much as 90% heavy minerals: a large quantity of magnetite grains supplemented with "a surprising number of perfect, doubly terminated crystals, often gemlike, clear and flawless." Well, now they had my attention!

For anyone interested in collecting such sands themselves, I've had best success on days of exceptionally high tide. I search the high-water line as the tides are receding, particularly near breakwaters where the energy of ocean swells is concentrated. Here and there, like dark bruises on the beach, I'll find an ultra-thin frosting of sparkling black sand that I skim into a baggie with a plastic scoop like a credit card. Back home, I'll swoosh my sample around in my gold pan to concentrate it still further and once it's dry...well...the accompany photo speaks for itself.

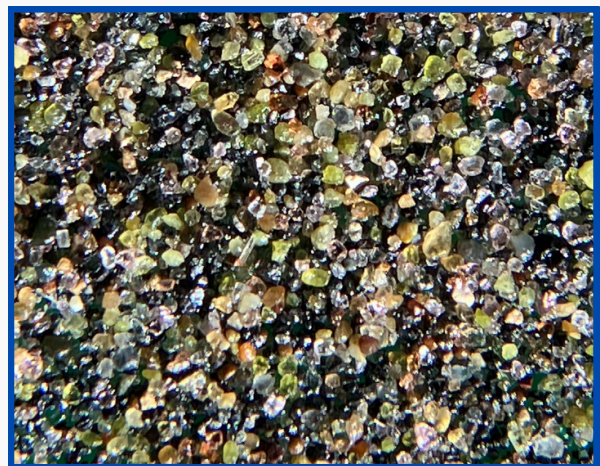
They went on to note that anyone with a gold pan and a microscope could concentrate such black sands for better viewing of material that is "well worth a look." Well, I have a gold pan. I have a microscope. So look I did! The accompanying photos reveal what I found at Loon Point in Santa Barbara County and here along Pierpont Bay at the end of Seaward Avenue in Ventura.

We end on a mystery. Norris and Woodhouse note that these gem-laden sands “suggest the streams in the region have been eroding igneous or metamorphic rock and carrying the debris to the beaches, yet no geologist has so far found such an occurrence of igneous or metamorphic rock in the Santa Ynez Range.” The ultimate source of our little gems? Nobody knows!

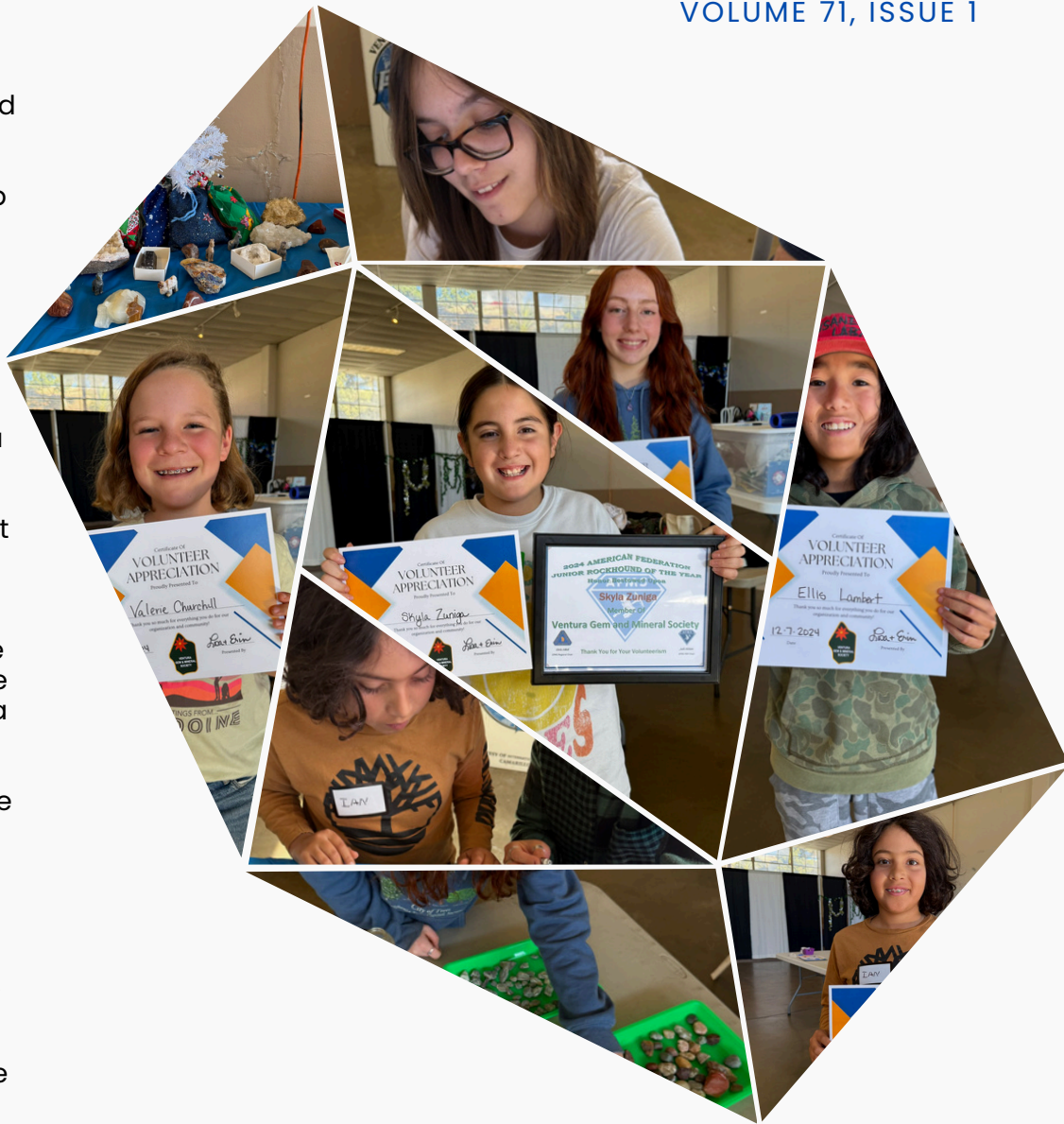

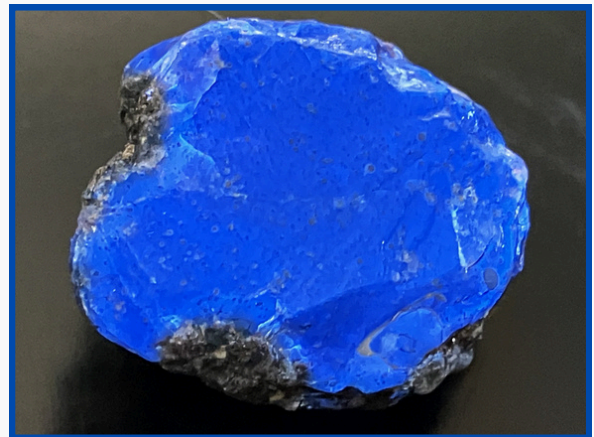
The Monthly Challenge

Ray Ritchey (1945-2024)

Ray Ritchey passed away on December 5, 2024, one month short of his 80th birthday. Ray was born in San Francisco, CA. He attended high school in Bangkok, Thailand while his father was employed with Pan American Airways. He served in the ROTC in Thailand, in a special unit for prospective medical students.

Ray was an avid rockhound and member of numerous gem and mineral societies throughout much of his life. He was instrumental in forming the Monrovia Rockhounds, Inc. (Moroks), and for many years was a dedicated member of the Ventura Gem & Mineral Society, Pasadena Lapidary Society, and numerous other organizations.

He led many rock collecting field trips with his wife Jo Anna for the last 50+ years and donated over 50 tons of rocks, minerals and fossils to numerous museums and mineral societies including the Jurupa Mountains Discovery Center, California Federation of Mineralogical Societies, Pasadena Lapidary Society, and Ventura Gem & Mineral Society. Ray also donated over 700 books related to the history of aircraft from World War II and related subjects towards the history library at the Commemorative Air Force, Southern California Wing, Camarillo Airport.

Ray began showing signs of serious medical symptoms in the mid-90s, probably related to his work with the ROTC in Southeast Asia during the 1960s. He did his best to continue to live with his difficult medical conditions. His effort at surviving gave him 30 extra years to share his knowledge about rocks, minerals, fossils, lapidary hobbies, collecting sites, field trip routes and most of all, teaching others about the hobby that he loved so much. He was always preparing and assembling necklaces and other types of jewelry to be donated for future sales as fund raisers at mineral shows.

Jo Anna says that they were to celebrate their 60th anniversary in just a few months. Services for Ray will be held at Rose Hills Memorial Park in Whittier, CA, on Wednesday, January 22 at 3:00pm. In lieu of flowers, please consider a cash donation to a gem and mineral society of your choice.
