

Sometimes the recreated gemstone is less flawless than the real gemstone. In fact, using unused "Tidy Bowl" cleaner

This Month - Virgin Valley Opal

The October 23 club meeting program will be presented by Walt Lombardo on "Precious and common Opal from Virgin Valley Opal District, Humboldt County Nevada". Virgin Valley has been producing precious opal for more than 100 years. The opal is found in the Miocene age rhyolitic tuffs along with gold

and minerals bearing uranium (carnotite) and mercury. The opal can be highly fluorescent, due to uranium. The precious opal showing spectral colors occurs in nodules and fossilized wood, bone and teeth. It will be a very interesting talk.

Walt Lombardo is a geologist with more than 35 years' experience mineralogy, mining and mineral exploration. Walt is also owner of Nevada Mineral & Book Club Company located in Orange, California.

Weeding Continues at the Club Library

Robert Seaton, David Springer, Erin Valenzuela, and I spent the morning of September 28 huddled in the clubhouse library room with my dog Tornjak getting truly serious with our library weeding project. As noted last month, we've undertaken this process to remove books taking up shelf space that are deemed unessential or tangential for club purposes and member interests, especially titles that have not been checked out for years and years, if ever. The goal? To have a streamlined library more easily organized and accessible and truly useful for our army of amateurs. Books targeted for removal? Duplicate copies, outdated fieldtrip guides, old and arcane textbooks, overly technical tomes from geological surveys, old black-and-white books doing disservice to colorful fluorescent minerals, etc.

We made significant progress. Some 300 books have been boxed up and will be made available for purchase by club members at Rocktoberfest and at our November silent auction at a buck a book. That still leaves more than 300 books on our shelves that can assist you, whether you're looking for a place to collect minerals or fossils, tips on lapidary or metal work or jewelry-making, learning about meteorites or fluorescent minerals, gold prospecting, identifying specimens in your collection, or just gazing at pretty pictures in a coffeetable book. It's all there! If you haven't acquainted yourself with our library holdings, check it out next time you're at the clubhouse. Now that we've winnowed the collection, the next step will be getting it better organized to assist your perusal.

Over the years, we've accepted pretty much any book that was donated to the library, and we are grateful for them because they've helped to build a very solid collection. Going forward, we need to be much more selective, though, with a target on new books (sorry; no old textbooks from the 1960s!) and titles immediately applicable to the interests of amateur Rockhounds, fossil collectors, and lapidary artists. For instance, no copies of the 1989 AAA Travel Guide to Nevada. But yes to any brand new copies of Gem Trails of California! We have limited space in our library room, and we want to maximize it with titles of most direct appeal to the most members possible.

CFMS Alert on Proposed National Monuments

According to a recent email from the President Marcia Goetz of the California Federation of Mineralogical Societies, there's a push for President Biden to declare two new national monuments in southern California during his remaining months in office: Chuckwalla National Monument (660,000 acres) and Kw'tsan National Monument (390,000 acres). The lands within the proposed monuments include well-known collecting sites like the Hauser Geode Beds, Chuckwalla agate, chalcedony and jasper fields, and classic spots where blue Dumortierite and kyanite, petrified wood, and petrified palm have been collected since at least the 1930s. Per Marcia's email, should these areas become national monuments, a huge swath of desert land would be permanently closed to recreational rockhounding.

Whether you approve or disapprove such designation, Marcia encourages you to write your elected representatives in Congress to voice your opinion, and she provides web addresses to assist in finding your representatives and their contact info, along with a link to the White House:

Thirty-seven Cases; Three Amigos

On September 17 John Cook and I once again saddled up the horses and hit the dusty trail north to Bakersfield to serve as judges for gems, minerals, fossils and lapidary arts at the Kern County Fair. Arriving at the fairgrounds, we corralled our horses with Wes Lingerfelt's of the Orcutt Mineral Society to round out The Three Amigos. Clipboards and scoresheets in hand, black sombreros flopping in the Central Valley breeze, and pencils drawn, for the next several hours we went case-bycase taking shots at all manner of rocky displays. Fortunately for The Amigos, the Kern County Fair only has case displays to judge (no individual items, as at the Ventura County Fair), so judging proceeds fairly quickly.

We've judged here many years now and saw the fair take

a real hit from the pandemic. Prior to Covid, we would have 40 to 45 displays to judge. That number declined to 21 in 2021, then crept up to 27 in 2022. Last year, the number went back down to 21. While low in quantity, high in quality. But this year the number bounced back up. We worked our way through 37 display cases. Like last year, folks offered beautiful self-collected rocks and minerals and well-crafted jewelry nicely arranged. It was especially cool seeing local material, like fossils from Shark Tooth Hill, a range of petrified wood and palm from the ancient Kern River channel, and other Kern County bounty.

Next year, in addition to checking out our own Ventura County Fair, consider visiting the many other county fairs across the state to see what neighboring like-minded souls are up to. It may inspire ideas for a display of your own!

Jim and Nancy's Great Adventure: Helping a Fellow CFMS Club in Monterey

September isn't September without a trip to Monterey! So on September 20th Nancy and I packed up the car and, with canine companion Tornjak, we headed north to the Monterey County Fairgrounds to participate in the 62nd annual show of the Carmel Valley Gem & Mineral Society. CVGMS was the first rock club we ever joined with two preschool kids back in the last century, circa 1991. (Those preschoolers are now ages 36 and 39 with preschoolers of their own and/or in the making.) We've remained CVGMS members all these years, and even after moving to Ventura in 1998, we've returned each year to help with the annual show—with the exception of a 3-year gap when the pandemic wreaked havoc on the club and its membership.

Like last year, when a rag-tag crew managed to pull it together, this year's show seemed a success despite last minute hiccups like the food vendor canceling and having to be replaced at a moment's notice and one dealer with a lot of reserved floor space phoning in with Covid. Although the show has become smaller, a steady (if not overwhelming) stream of attendees flowed all weekend long. The show included 14 dealers, 1 food truck, 36 displays (including impressive boulders of Big Sur jade, a fluorescent mineral booth, and 1001 cabochons), and several money-makers: \$5 admissions (yes, they charge admission for club shows up north), geode sawing, a silent auction, and a kids' area with spinning wheel, grab bags, fossil sifting, jewelry making, and pick-your-own tumbled stones.

As we've done for decades now, Nancy and I provided overnight security Friday and Saturday (cheapest room rate in Monterey!) and set up two display cases: California Spheres; Faces in Stone. We also promoted our 2025 VGMS Show with

flyers and ran the Silent Auction along with Sky Paxton. We seemed to do a good business with 20+ items out for bid each hour for 12 hours, and all items disappeared by the end of the show. Although we kept prices low, a couple primo pieces were put out each hour that would bring in up to \$60 or more. No tally yet, but last year's Silent Auction efforts brought in \$2,200.

encourage VGMS members, one and all, to check out the many local shows sponsored by clubs up and down California.

After enjoying Sunday night in a real hotel tucked into the seaside forest and dunes of Asilomar, we had hoped to take the Coast Highway home on Monday through Big Sur country to pick up serpentine for the grab bags and possibly a jade pebble or two at Jade Cove or Willow Creek while allowing Tor to romp along the beach. But, like last year, a stretch of highway appropriately called Regent's Slide was closed due to a road collapse from last winter's storms.

All-in-all, it's a trip well worth taking, and we invite you to join us when we return in 2025. Enjoy both the show and the scenic touristy venue. By then, surely, we'll be able to work in that twice-delayed side trip to Jade Cove?


Name that Specimen!
