



Ventura Gem & Mineral Society, Inc. joined the **California Federation of Mineralogical Societies** in **1946**. That has long been used as our "official" start date; however, the story is a bit more complicated. The society held its first meeting **December 27, 1944**, in a "rumpus room," with mostly teenagers in attendance. A constitution was adopted on November 10, 1945, and the club voted to join CFMS on February 9, 1946. But it wasn't until **November 14, 1953**, that a motion was made to execute formal articles of incorporation with the State of California. That incorporation became official in **1954** with a new set of by-laws, the first separate Board Meeting, and the official name of the Ventura Gem and Mineral Society, Incorporated.





Number of members

In 2023, we had **222 members**: 169 adults, 46 Pebble Pups, and 7 Junior Members. We had **1 honorary member**. (One-year honorary membership is extended to awardees of our club-sponsored college scholarship.) Children members fall into two categories: Pebble Pups (5-11 years old) and Juniors (12-17 years old). Annual dues (not prorated) are \$20 for an individual and \$10 for each subsequent adult member/s in a household. Children ages 6 through 18 are \$10 each. Children 5 years old and under are free when enrolling with a paid adult.

We meet at 7:30 PM on the fourth Wednesday of most months; meetings are the second Wednesday in November and December due to Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays. The Poinsettia Pavilion is dramatically located in the foothills overlooking Ventura with ample parking and has the advantage of large meeting rooms with amenities (podium, sound system,

screens with VCR and DVD connections, slideshow screen, tables, and chairs, etc.) and an adjacent full-service kitchen. The two meeting rooms we have frequently used in the past are spacious and inviting. Any virtual meetings are held on Zoom.

Our clubhouse is located in Ojai, California, just Northeast of Ventura across from Camp Comfort County Park. Our Pebble Pup Program is normally held at this location on the third Saturday of the month from 10-12 pm. The clubhouse is also the location of our museum, library, and workshop.

Mission or purpose of the club

The Ventura Gem & Mineral Society was incorporated as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, educational organization to promote popular interest in geology, mineralogy, paleontology, and lapidary and jewelry arts; to sponsor educational activities centered around these subjects, including lectures, classes, demonstrations, and field trips; and to make and exhibit collections for the enjoyment and education of both society members and the community at large.

In advancing this mission, our specific strategies are:

- 1. To offer a warm club atmosphere in which experts and amateurs can pursue and share their interests and knowledge at monthly club meetings and in workshop settings.
- 2. To host a gem and mineral show once a year for our surrounding community.
- 3. To host field trips for collecting, as well as trips to other club shows, museums, rock shops, and similar venues.
- 4. To maintain a club museum collection of gems, minerals, and fossils for educational purposes within the larger community (particularly for school visits) and a collection of lapidary rough for use by members in club workshops.
- 5. To maintain a library of relevant books and magazines for reference by members.
- 6. To provide the children of our community with a safe place to learn, explore, and appreciate the earth sciences with activities under the guidance of our adult members.

January 2023 "Show and Tell": Our January program was the annual Show and Tell. A dozen or so members, including youth members, presented their finds, projects, and collections.








February 2023 "Show Planning" led by our Show Chair, Diane Cook. This month we went over everything related to our upcoming club Show. Our club Show moved to a new building at the Ventura County Fairgrounds so there were some changes from previous years.



March 2023 "A Science Museum for Santa Paula" by Marcus Eriksen: Dr. Marcus Eriksen and his partner, Anna Cummings, recently moved to Santa Paula with the goal of opening a Science Education Center in Ventura County. They're already off to a great start in terms of specimens, with a *Triceratops* skull currently housed in a hangar on their ranch. Dr. Eriksen also spoke about dinosaur hunting on his Wyoming property.





April 2023 "Silent Auction" led by our Programs Director, Terry Wilson, and our Club Stewards. Members came prepared to bid on slabs, rough, cabs, and any other fun surprises brought from our clubhouse and donated by members.





May 2023 "The Petrified Forest of Calistoga, CA" by VGMS President John Cook. John took us on a virtual trip to Calistoga in Napa County. Not only is it home to therapeutic hot springs and mineral spas, Calistoga has the purest, award-winning and best tasting sparkling mineral water in the area. Calistoga is also home to a spectacular petrified forest of redwood trees! About four million years ago, the now extinct Mount Saint Helena volcano (which also goes by the Modoc Indian name "Kenoki") let loose like an early version of Mount St. Helens. The volcano is extinct but that long-ago blast flattened a forest of immense trees, and its ash buried and preserved them as they fell, frozen in time.





June 2023 "Mini Presentations" by the VGMS Pebble Pups. Several Pups in our club earned their Communications badges by delivering hobby-related presentations.





July 2023 "Geologic Features of the Ventura Foothills and Harmon Canyon" by Tim Garvey: Geologist Tim Garvey helped us look beyond the iconic scenery to understand the geologic processes that shaped the fascinating rocks found in some of these locales. Member Melissa Baffa also gave us an short presentation on her recent experience at a dinosaur dig.





August 2023 "Condor Agates" by Luis De Los Santos: Luis De Los Santos regaled us with his adventures collecting agates in Argentina. Members greatly enjoyed his descriptions of the land, people, and especially the rocks he came across during his time there. Luis shared beautiful pictures of condor and puma agates, as well as a wide variety of fossil cycads and pine cones.



September 2023 "Emerald Mining in California" by Richard Edley: Richard Edley delivered an interesting talk about his search and discovery of emeralds in Southern California. Richard and his son, Bruce, own two federal mining claims in Barstow, California. The Beautiful Paige mine produces turquoise and azure malachite. They also discovered a deposit of emeralds in the Julian mining District in Southern California.



October 2023 "The Inner Beauty of Caves" by Mary Pat Weber, CGMS:Mary Pat Weber provided us with a visual treat of the highlights of this recent event and why this show rocks! Located at the Tucson Convention Center, TGMS Show attendees find approximately 250 dealers selling a variety of minerals, fossils, jewelry, and lapidary. Throughout the show there are lectures and symposiums. Jaw-dropping world class exhibits from private collections, major universities and museums are on display. Other exhibit cases, both competitive and non-competitive, round out this mix.



November 2023: Annual Election of Officers, followed by a Silent Auction: in November we had a Silent Auction and November autumn potluck. It was well-attended with something for everyone to see, buy, and eat. Thank you to everyone who helped prepare the auction and to everyone who brought delicious food to share. Thank you also to the nominating committee, who delivered the slate of nominations for the 2024 VGMS Board.



December 2023: Holiday Party our **Annual Holiday Gathering**, followed by **Installation of Officers** and an **Awards Ceremony** in person at the Poinsettia Pavilion. Awards included Rockhound of the Year, presentation of officer and committee pins and bars, and a gift exchange.

Pebble Pup & Juniors Program




We have 46 Pebble Pups and 7 Junior Members in good standing (a Pebble Pup is defined as being age 5-11 and Junior Members are age 12 through 17). On average, 12-17 pups/juniors regularly attended meetings or field trips each month. **Lisa Batchelder-Hetrick is our Pebble Pups Program Director and Committee Chair. Erin Valenzula is the Lead Educator.** Lisa and Erin are working together to provide a well rounded program while also developing a more robust Junior Member program. The program meets in person, but can hold classes on Zoom at any time due to weather, illness, or to invite an out-of-the-area guest speaker for the group. If a meeting is a planned ZOOM event a learning kit is mailed to the children who have RSVP'd for an event. All others are welcome to join and follow along. For in person classes, an RSVP is requested to prepare materials for each child. Specimens or projects are given at every class.



1. **Picnic "Rocktoberfest"** On October 21st, VGMS hosted its annual fall breakfast and picnic, "Rocktoberfest." Our sign-up sheet shows 34 but 42 members were counted in attendance.

Rocktoberfest Rocks Again!

Our annual Rocktoberfest picnic brunch and silent auction took place Saturday, October $21^{\rm st}$ from 9:00 a.m. to noon. The day before, Ron Wise, John Cook, Robert Seaton, David Springer, Rich Pisor, and I gathered as a clean-up crew to rake leaves, sweep clean the sidewalks and parking lot, and prep pop-up canopies, chairs, tables, etc., for quick layout and assembly.

Despite it being fall, perfect summer weather prevailed with

lots of sunshine flooding happy faces during the Fest. The signin sheet showed a total of 34 folks, including at least five Pebble Pups and Junior members, but an informal tally suggests attendance was actually closer to 40. To tempt members to sit down and dig in to the big variety of potluck goodies everyone brought, Dick White filled the air with flavorful aroma at the bacon station while other volunteers prepared fresh pancakes and scrambled eggs. Once fortified, folks had table after table

Below is a summary of our Show that appeared in the March, 2023 issue of our newsletter, *Rockhound Rambling*.



Two Busy Days at the Teacher Station and Scavenger Hunt, Jim Brace-Thompson: During our Diamond Jubilee Show, we had a fun busy time at the Welcome Booth with our Teacher Station and Scavenger Hunt. The Teacher Station had free educational packets and rocks. To increase their educational value, I packaged all rocks with labels providing background info, such as whether the rocks were igneous, sedimentary, or metamorphic, if they were an economic mineral, etc. Most teachers tentatively selected one rock from the bin but jumped right in when they learned they got five specimens each. We distributed 70 Teacher Packets and gave out 350 fist-sized specimens.

Kids turned in 211 "Rock Out!" Scavenger Hunt questionnaires and kept us busy throughout the weekend passing out questionnaires and pencils then directing kids to the "Treasure Basket" to pick free prizes. The questionnaire had four questions designed to give us a little survey as to what were the most popular displays, demos, etc. Following are stats from this year's hunt with the top five responses (and the percentage of kids responding) for each question.

What were your favorite activities at the Kids' Booth? Spinning wheel – 22%, Sand Sifting – 21%, Dino Dig – 16%, Coloring Corner – 15%, Cinderella Rocks and Touch Stones – 8%. Here are a few of the more interesting responses. "I liked the ugly rocks because they are ugly and not ugly." "Wheel was my favorite because the suspense made it even more exciting and it was cheap!" "The sand sifting because you could find rocks you don't even know!" "The kids booth because I'm a kid." "The whole booth because it brings joy to my day."

What was your favorite display case? Answers were all over the map on this one, and I think each display earned at least one vote. In fact, one kid wrote, "I love them all!" Those receiving the most votes, though, were: Chris and Bob's Volcano – 9%, The saber-tooth cat in the California State Symbols display ("I like tigers.") – 7%, a tie at 6% each: Fluorescent Minerals and Fossils, a four-way tie at 4% eacg: Marine Fossils, Lake Superior Agates, Boulder Opal, Attack of the Pac-Man Rocks, Dinosaurs – 3%. We enjoyed at least one

unusual answer here. Can you spot it? "The rock." "The Pac-Man rocks because they looked funny and made me laugh." "Chickens." "The Ventura Gem & Mineral Society case — it had a blade from Apex Legends. They're sooo cool!"

Check out our dealers. If you could be a dealer, what would you sell? Rocks. (Just rocks). – 13%, Fossils – 8%, Geodes and Jewelry – 6% each, Dino Fossils and Gems – 5% each, Diamonds, Opals, and Amethyst – 4% each. Some of the things kids said they would sell were, well, interesting. For instance... "Chickens." (Again?? What's with the chicken kid?) "I'm gonna sell money." "Amethyst or emeralds at \$20 each." (Hey! I'm buying from that kid!) "Mermaid rocks." "Surf boards." (If you had seen this kid and his dad, you would understand.) "Cookies." "Gelato." "Toys." "Rock unicorns."

Who was your favorite demonstrator? Gold Panning – 26%, Rock Carvers (Go, Rylee and Dick!) – 11%, Chris Ward's Matching Games – 10%, Bob Knox's Volcano – 9%, Tony and Sandie Fender's Beading and Jewelry Making – 7%. Here are a few individual responses about our demonstrators. "I like volcano guy best because he explains the insides of a volcano and it has cool rocks and pretend fire and lights and he was very nice." "There was a lady making glass jewelry and she had a heat thingy which was cool." "The different egg demonstrator because you played a fun game and learn new eggs and we need to give the animals the eggs."

Remember this for next year: it pays to be nice! Several kids rated various individuals as their favorite demonstrator, including Jenifer, Elyssa, Bob Knox, and Joe-the-Gold-Panner. Why? "Because s/he is nice!" No grumps allowed!

Publicizing our "Diamond Jubilee" Show, Jim Brace-Thompson: Ever wonder what goes into publicizing our annual show? No? Well, I'll tell you anyway. Each year, I start with a checklist and work my way down. That checklist includes 26 "action items" spaced out over the course of a year. As you can surmise, we've hit the bottom of the list. Here's a brief summary of just some of the items, along with a few statistics.

Show flyers were distributed at local club shows, the 2023 CFMS Show, the Ventura County Fair, the Fall CFMS Directors' Meeting, and sent to all our dealers. A supply was placed in the E.P. Foster Library downtown and given to members to distribute locally, along with a sweep of Main Street, Ventura. Plus, some teachers requested supplies to distribute within their schools.

I mailed show postcards to the 800 names we've built up on a direct-mail list based on folks who have attended our past shows and have asked to be kept posted about future shows.

I sent out an email blast to nearly 600 teachers who have voluntarily given us their email addresses at our Show Teacher Station over the years.

Letters, along with show flyers and a press release went to 116 geology professors from UCLA to UC-Santa Barbara and all colleges in between.

A press release was sent to the CFMS newsletter and website, 22 local and national publications, and all local newspapers and TV/radio stations. An ad and article appeared in the *Ventura Breeze*, plus we made the calendar listing in Westways magazine! (One family attending our show from San Luis Obispo said that's where they heard about it.)

Invitations went to 25 local youth groups and to 43 rock clubs within convenient driving distance.

We had displays promoting our club and our show at both the Ventura County Fair and in our downtown library, along with club and show flyers, which were also distributed to local hotels and the Ventura Visitor's Center.

Diane Cook and Lisa Batchelder-Hetrick took charge of blanketing social media, which has become ever more important.

Finally, YOU, our local members, helped immeasurably with good old fashioned word-of-mouth to tempt friends, family, neighbors and work colleagues to come on down. Thank you!

As you can see, there's a lot more to publicizing a show than meets the eye. By the way, publicity has already begun toward our 2024 Show! Watch for our "rough-and-ready" informal show flyers at the Conejo club show next month in Newbury Park. See you there?

Special Features - Club Library

Our Librarian **Heather Seaton** maintains a room with a reading table and walls lined with bookshelves housing approximately **615 books**. These include over 135 specific to California geology and rockhounding. We also have **a significant periodicals collection**: a nearly complete run of *Desert Magazine* from 1945 to 1961, a nearly complete run of *Lapidary Journal* (back to Volume 1, Number 1), along with miscellaneous issues of *Rock & Gem* magazine. We stock several dozen videos and DVDs. To promote the use of the library, Angela included an occasional column entitled "The Book Report" in our newsletter detailing new books added to the library.

For ease in finding just the right title for their needs, our club members can access our catalog of titles entirely online via the "Library" page on our website. Within the library room, books are arranged by broad topical areas, such as Field Trip Guides, Lapidary Arts & Jewelry Making, Geology, Fossils & Paleontology, Mineralogy, Gold Prospecting, Meteorites, etc.

The Archives

The archives are in year-by-year binders recording our entire club history from our founding in 1944 to the present all stored in nearly four dozen binders. By the way, conveniently located right next to our Library Room is our Todd Schowalter Reading Room (more commonly referred to as the club toilet).



Special Feature – Yearbook Committee

We have an officially designated committee position for Historian/Archivist, which has been held for the past couple of years by Jim Brace-Thompson. When we decided to enter the All American Club program for this year, we did designate a full committee for the effort. We have listed our All American Club Committee members at the very beginning of this document. They include Lisa Batchelder-Hetrick, Jim Brace-Thompson, Nancy Brace-Thompson, Diane Cook, and Celia Churchill.

Special Feature – Website Committee

In 2023 our Website Committee consisted of current and former Web Directors Troy Schmidt and Terry Wilson.

Special Feature - Lapidary Studio/Workshop

Our club maintains a workshop and lapidary studio at our Clubhouse. We offer a saw room, flat lap, and Genies for crafting cabochons. Under the supervision of our Club Stewards, we offer monthly Open Workshops to all club members. We also offer a certification process

Special Feature – Museum

VGMS developed and maintains **The Ray Meisenheimer Memorial Museum** at our clubhouse, which is open during VGMS open-house days the third Saturday of each month and by advance appointment for individuals and/or group public visits. The museum is publicized at our annual show, shows of neighboring clubs, the Ventura County Fair, and fliers distributed at all public events we attend, including school visits and programs. Prior to the pandemic, we hosted several schools and home-school groups for tours and activities.

Member Jim Brace-Thompson and Troy Schmidt are the co-chairs of the Museum Committee. The museum consists of two rooms. One focuses on California Dinosaurs and Lapidary Arts. Displays consist of bone casts and actual bones of dinosaurs and marine reptiles from California and a 6-foot long display case illustrating a full range of lapidary arts and jewelry making. The second room houses an "Ice Age California" collection and display of bone casts and actual bones and tusks of Pleistocene mammals, as well as a wall mural (painted by our member and professional artist Martha Moran) that reconstructs what Ventura County looked like during the Ice Ages. The room also houses educational displays showing gems, minerals, and fossils from our local region and from around the world and a fluorescent mineral case.







We also have an outdoor self-guided rock and fossil museum in the front yard of the clubhouse. Each specimen is labeled. This is an especially good location because our Pebble Pups classes are held here.







Field Trips

Our club maintains close relationships with the two other rock clubs in Ventura County: Oxnard Gem & Mineral Society (OGMS) and Conejo Gem & Mineral Club (CGMC). The three field trip chairs from our clubs meet to plan the annual field trip schedule, which are then offered to members of all three clubs. Thus, while we offer almost-monthly field trips to our members, our own club hosts about a third of these events. These are the field trips VGMS hosted in 2023.

In 2023, **we were able to offer at least 19 workshop opportunities**.

Club Website

Our current club website, **www.vgms.org**, is maintained by **Troy Schmidt**. Many new members and visitors have told us they found out about us via the site. Our website has password-protected "Members-Only" and "Board Members" areas so that information that should not be available to the public is accessible to members (i.e., tax information, contracts, field trip specifics, etc.).




The site includes helpful links for both club members and visitors to the site. These include links to the American and the California Federation of Mineralogical Societies, other Ventura County rock clubs, the U.S. Geological Survey, and Bureau of Land Management, museums, and more.

Our former Web Director and 2023 First VP **Terry Wilson** is a web developer by trade and has created a website called **Whoscoming.com/vgms** and **WhosBringingWhat.com/vgms**. These were crafted to better facilitate potluck sign-ups, working time slots for volunteers helping at club events (the annual Show, clubhouse clean-up days, etc.), and field trip sign-ups. They can be viewed by any member who wants to sign up for a club function via links on the main club website. They have proven helpful in preventing duplication of food items at potlucks and doubling-up of volunteers in one location during our Show. It has been a great addition to the club's main site.



VGMS membership payments online are available online with all major credit/debit cards or with PayPal. In 2023 we also introduced accepting membership payments via Zeffy. Our membership application can be completed entirely online, or it can be downloaded in printed form to be completed and mailed.

Finally, our club also maintains a **Facebook page**, which is linked to numerous other clubs, museums, scientific sites, and community sites. This page is maintained by members **Diane Cook** and **Lisa Batchelder-Hetrick**. It's a great method for sharing club activities, meeting information, photos, scientific articles, field trip information, and our Show, of course!



Traveling Club Displays

We don't have a single, pre-made, or pre-set club case. Instead, we have compiled materials that can be quickly accessed and assembled to address a variety of themes.

• California State Rock, Mineral, Gemstone, and Fossil Symbols. This has been a regular feature at our own annual Show and is also frequently requested at other nearby club shows (Conejo and Oxnard). In a take-one bin beside the case, we stock fliers telling about the state symbols along with a blurb about the club. We also frequently use materials from this display when giving school presentations.



• California Dinosaurs. We maintain a large selection of replica bones and fossils of dinosaurs and Ice Age mammals, and these have frequently been requested for full table-top displays at the neighboring Oxnard and Conejo club shows. We have a tri-fold board and fliers with information about California dinosaurs (and about our club museum) that go along with a full-size skull cast of our California State Dinosaur "Auggie" and a cast of a Mosasaur marine reptile skull.



• "Magic Minerals." We built a portable traveling fluorescent mineral display case, which proved instantly popular during school visits. This was used at Fred L. Williams Elementary School and Flory Elementary School Science Night. Alongside this, we offer hands-on fun with activities using magnets and magnetic minerals. We also present elements from this case as a hands-on Magic Minerals table.



• **Petrified Wood.** When long-time members Ray and Florence Meisenheimer passed away many years ago, they donated a terrific set of polished petrified wood rounds from across the West, along with labels, case liners, risers, and stands. This has proven to be a quick-and-easy backup display to pull into service at shows where gaps are left by no-show exhibitors.




• Finally, we create a **Club Publicity Case** with content that changes each year. This is installed at our March Show, including in 2023. This same case is also often installed to promote VGMS at nearby club shows.

Pebble Pups Virtual Class Library


Our Pebble Pup Chair Lisa Batchelder-Hetrick, continues to maintain and augment a library of our virtual Pups classes available on YouTube. By the end of 2023, the video library has over 24 episodes and documents available to view, with four new videos added in 2023. 
Our workshop at the clubhouse is open the 3rd Saturday of the month from 9 am to noon and for certified members, the first Sunday from noon to 3 pm.

Learn and Practice Lapidary in Our Workshop

Pursue individual lapidary and jewelry-making projects under the supervision of our shop stewards. The workshop space is divided between two buildings. Our garage holds slab saws and trim saws for cutting rocks to size for lapidary work. And within the clubhouse, the kitchen and laundry rooms have been converted to hold grinding and polishing units to craft cabs. The shop also features a fossil-prep station for extracting small fossils from matrix. Members must be certified by a shop steward in order to use the equipment. A request for certification can be found in the Member Area of the website.

Our Pebble Pups Chairs maintain a private social networking page via the Band app. Youth members and their parents are able to share news, discuss hobby-related topics, and add photos. 


Show fliers posted in public places




VGMS President John Cook and Scholarship Chair Shirley Layton presented Logan's award at the March board meeting.

Mojave Trails National Monument Working Group Seeks Input on Collecting Localities

Jim Brace-Thompson, Federation Director



It's been in the works for something like a decade now: turning a broad swath of the old Route 66 corridor into the Mojave Trails National Monument (MTNM). What was once administered by BLM, with more-or-less free access for rock collecting, will soon be administered by the National Parks Service.

With that could come elimination of rockhounding in such classic localities as the Cady Mountains, Marble Mountains, Bristol Mountains, and many, many more sites across an enormous region.

Rockhounding groups (including the California Federation of Mineralogical Societies, ALAA, and local California clubs) have been involved from the beginning to seek to preserve access to and collecting within rock, mineral, and fossil sites that go back to the early vesar of the 1900s. They've been on varied government committees, attended public input sessions, and have provided information on prized collecting localities and their access roads throughout the MTNM planning stages.

Now is when the pedal hits the metal. Rules and regulations and final implementation for formal establishment of the Mojave Trails National Monument could be just months away. Will Rockhounds retain collecting privileges within certain designated areas? Will the roads to those areas be kept open and maintained? If you are interested in learning more about all this and providing your voice and input, the designated contact person for the rockhounding community is Gregor Losson, eczlosson@yahoo.com, (310) 227-5647. Gregor also encourages folks to contact the official MTNM manager, Noelle Glines Bovio at nglinesbovio@blin.gov. From what I gather, if interested, you should contact them sooner rather than later!

Some classics on display will include drool worthy specimens of Biggs and Bruneau Jasper, Nipomo Sagenite and Beanfield agates, Deedeeite, Biconoids, Morgan Hill Poppy Jasper, Dryhead Agates (he used to own this mine himself!), some rare Laguna Agates, nice Monterey Formation fish fossils, some beautiful

petrified wood specimens including cycads, Boron Wood, etc. He has an entire wall of little polished slab collections showing the varieties within each different types of classic material displayed. And there is a lot more I have not listed. And like the Smithsonian, most of his collection resides in boxes that are not on display! Ralph has also shared some portions of his collections with other museums, notably, I observed two of his larger spheres (about 10-inch diameter) on display in the Crater Rock museum in southern Oregon, one made from a ginormous Dryhead agate, and the other a Wrightwood Rhodonite sphere.

After all participants have had their guided tour through Ralph's museum, it is off to the home of Wes Lingerfelt in Nipomo, (about 15 minutes north of Santa Maria). Wes is an early sphere making phenom and rockhound legend unto himself, who started collecting in earnest about 30 years ago. He has a yard full of equipment, rough rock, and a shop full of polished and rough specimens, spheres, jewelry, knick knacks, etc. Rough rock prices are generally \$0.25/pound!

Recap of the 2023 AFMS Show & Convention

The American Federation of Mineralogical Societies (AFMS) is a national umbrella organization composed of seven regional federations (like our CFMS) and some 600 local clubs (like our own VGMS). AFMS gathers for business meetings and festivities once a year, with the location cycling around the 7 regions. This year's Annual Show & Convention took place August 3-5th in the Northwest Federation and was hosted by the Billings Gem & Mineral Club in Billings, Montana. I attended and participated as AFMS 5th Vice President/CFMS Rep to AFMS, AFMS Public Relations Chair, and a member of the Rules Committee that directs competitive exhibiting at Federation shows. In addition to me, several others from Ventura County attended, including members of our own VGMS and our neighboring Conejo club. Following are selected items of interest emerging from the convention meetings.

New AFMS officers were voted upon and sworn in for 2024: **President** – Roger Burford, **President-Elect** – J.C. Moore, **1st Vice President** – Ronna Watkins, **2nd Vice President** – David Wayment, **3rd Vice President** – Sheri Johnson, **4th Vice President** – Jim Brace-Thompson, **5th Vice President** – Ellery Borow, **Secretary** – Donna Moore, and **Treasurer** – Pat LaRue.

Efforts are well underway to make the Uniform Rules Manual more user-friendly by breaking it into more-or-less self-contained sections to minimize the need to flip back-and-forth among sections. The manual will also be supported with PowerPoint presentations that I'm preparing to provide visual

guidance (for instance, photos of actual exhibits to illustrate elements of showmanship that judges score). They also hope to sponsor a Judges' Training Seminar in conjunction with the 2024 AFMS Show in Ventura.

Lora Hall has assembled an outstanding team between herself, Dennis Gertenbach, and Joan Stoker for the Junior Programs Committee. They've added much to the AFMS/FRA program beyond the badges; for instance, a newsletter by kids for kids, contests, the Juniors Volunteer Award pin, and more. Check out the many fantastic resources at www.juniors.amfed.org.

Work on upgrading the AFMS website is nearing completion. As a sneak preview of what the new site will be like, check out the AFMS Juniors section, which is already completed.

A Zoom roundtable seminar hosted by yours truly is planned for late October/early November on "Practicing Public Relations in the Age of New Media." Whether promoting a club as a whole or a special event like an annual show, social media is now a vital part of the marketing mix. Tips and suggestions emerging from the seminar will be shared in the pages of the AFMS and CFMS newsletters.

For a full week following the show, Doug True of the local Billings club led a field trip a day for everything from agates to fossils. Because I had to be back in Ventura to host a Fossil Day for the Ventura YMCA, I could only stick around Montana to attend the first field trip for Bear Canyon Agate along with several other VGMS and Conejo club members. It was a fun time with fine field trip weather. I'm hoping we might hold a

similar field trip or two when we host the AFMS Show next year.

Finally, VGMS is now officially on the schedule to host the 2024 AFMS Show & Convention May 24-26. I entered a display and handed out packets at this year's show to promote it. As noted earlier, the AFMS Show & Convention cycles around to California only once every seven years. The Billings Gem & Mineral Club did a superb job hosting this year's national show and will be a tough act to follow. We'll need all hands on deck! 


A Win-Win-Win with Rock & Gem Magazine

"Hurriquake" Brings Earth Processes into Sharp Relief for Locals

Did you feel it? In the midst of day-long rains from Tropical Storm Hilary on August 20th, a magnitude 5.1 earthquake rattled our region. Centered on the Sisar fault system some three miles southeast of Ojai and 11 miles northeast of Ventura, it struck at 2:41 in the afternoon when I was seated at my home desk. At first my computer screen wobbled, then the wall began to creak and sway, and soon enough I felt the floor rolling beneath my feet. (At my age, it's good to know that these old feet can still rock and roll!) By this time, my dog Tornjak was barking at the window, telling folks to cut it out.

The main quake was followed by dozens of aftershocks, including several that measured above magnitude 3.0. One of those rattled the windows and rolled me out of bed at 4:40 the next morning. The good news? It appears there was little damage in the region. No deaths. No injuries. No tsunami to send us scampering into the foothills. Per the Los Angeles Times, the damage that did occur was rather minimal, but tell that to the manager of the Ojai Beverage Company, who had to witness a \$900 bottle of tequila falling from a top shelf. He breathed a sigh of relieve when it didn't break, only to watch as the cork popped out and the contents glugged across the floor. He told the Times there was just enough left in the bottle for the clean-up crew to enjoy a wee sip each. First time he'd tried \$900 tequila.

Because it occurred in the midst of Tropical Storm Hilary, the media immediately dubbed the event a "hurriquake" while spreading the news far and wide. I received emails from friends in Michigan, Oregon, and even Scotland. Nothing to worry about, I assured them. Just another day in Paradise!

A Blast From the Past: The Evolution of Show Posters



hasn't always been so.






